





The URBACT e-University held in September and October of 2020 was the first large scale fully digital learning event designed for the local stakeholders involved in Action Planning Networks, it consisted of 8 workshops, enabling the participants to acquire skills, techniques and tactics to start working with the local groups and build local urban Integrated Action Plans. The ULG members from Riga Kristīne Šuļžanoka reveals her impressions about the learning event:

Within past month I was honoured to have a unique opportunity to partake in a wonderful online event called URBACT eUniversity. What started as a helpful assistance request to substitute my boss a time or two to keep her in the loop on interesting subjects that were presented, ended into most anticipated Tuesdays and Thursdays of 2020!

I'm sure, if you are reading this you have attended countless, rather mundane Zoom meetings since March, some were worth your time, and let's be very honest, some – not so much. When I found out that I will have that "thrill" to fill in for yet another series Zoom meetings, to say the least, I wasn't thrilled, but I did sign in, I listened and during session 1 had very strong feelings about it – love it, it's brilliant! The first plenary session, right after Grand Opening of eUniversity, led by Mary was almost intoxicating... after months upon months of mundane meetings, you somewhat become programmed to be skeptical and be, prepared for the worst, but, I must say, URBACT team are professionals indeed. You can tell they came prepared and with a mission to conquer – to get you sucked-in this whole process and make you want to keep coming back for more. Not going to lie, by the end of week 1, not even knowing whether I will be able to join in for future sessions, I just kept on asking to share plenary links, if there are new ones, just because I wanted to come back for more. The best part of eUniversity is that even now that it's over, all the materials, including video is freely available online to go back and relive it whenever you need a tool mentioned in the sessions or just are in a need of inspiration to proceed with the ULG meeitings, Roadmap and Integrated Action plans.
